MCOA History: The Massachusetts Association of Councils on Aging and Senior Center Directors was incorporated as a 501c3 non-profit in 1979, though its origin can be traced back at least to 1974 when the first known statewide gathering of Councils on Aging staff and board members occurred in Northampton, Massachusetts. Currently 350 communities have established a COA municipal department.

Mission: Building strategic partnerships to educate, empower, and advocate for professionals who work with older adults.


Vision: Statewide collaboration to advance the quality of life for older adults.

A Message from Our Board President

As I look back on my first year as President of MCOA, I find myself in awe of the people who comprise this great association. Whether it be the talented professionals who work for us all and carry the MCOA banner out into the community or the COA membership from across the Commonwealth, we are clearly a tremendous asset for everyone in Massachusetts. Together we grew new programs, enhanced existing choices, and saw participation in senior center activities expanding everywhere.

An increase in COA Formula Grants and strong Incentive Grant programming added to the mix.

When needed, we stood together in adversity against that which would damage elders or their resources. We advocated for the creation of new housing, transportation, health care, and tax relief opportunities.

We even added a brand new COA when New Ashford joined us as the newest COA in Massachusetts.

On a personal note, I have been appointed to Governor Baker's Commission to Study Aging in Massachusetts; a great honor and a great opportunity to participate in the creation of a new and forward-looking agenda for all of us here in the Commonwealth.

Yes, it has been a great year full of momentum, excitement and growth. We're expecting more of the same in the coming months. We know that there are now more adults aged 60 and older in Massachusetts than there are children under the age of 20. What we do, what we will continue to do, will resonate in Massachusetts for a generation. I think we're heading in the right direction, don't you? We don't know what the future will bring, we cannot predict the future here in Massachusetts, nor can we predict what the next year will bring from Washington to our borders. Regardless, we will be here doing what we do best, creatively supporting our elders in their communities wherever they may be. That is a guarantee.

MCOA: FY17 Highlights

Advocacy

- In FY17, MCOA Membership voted to pause our campaign to raise the COA Formula Grant from \$8/elder (FY15) to \$12/elder by FY20. We will resume this effort next year by asking for \$15.6 million for FY19 in Line Item #9110-9002, which will allow for \$11/elder and then \$17 million in FY20 (\$12).
- Proposed a package of updates and changes to existing Property Tax Relief Legislation.
- Joined the Massachusetts Aging and Mental Health Coalition to increase funding for elder mental health programs and training.
- Along with our key partners, MCOA co-founded the Elder Economic Security Coalition to advance the
 economic security of older adults; our first three priorities are to close the SNAP Gap, expand access to
 the Medicare Savings Accounts, and to update legislation and regulations that govern Property Tax
 Relief programs for older adults.
- Sought increased funding for Protective Services and Nutrition Programs because of increased demand.
- Reviewed proposed Assisted Living, Home Care Program, and Protective Service Regulations and provided input on their implementation.

Healthy Aging

- Supported 20 local Keep Moving walking groups.
- Sponsored the 3rd Annual Statewide Go the Distance 1-Mile Walk Challenge.
- Purchased state license so any member may offer the Aging Mastery Program.
- Awarded grants to 4 new host sites for the Aging Mastery Program.
- Supported Live Your Life Well programs at 13 local COAs.
- Awarded grants to 3 communities to develop Dementia Friendly practices in their communities.
- Funded 8 new Memory Cafés.
- Contracted with a JFCS dementia specialist to produce a Memory Café Operations Manual, available online for a national audience to use, in both English and Spanish.
- Served on the Management Team for the Dementia Friendly Massachusetts Initiative.
- Served on the Executive Steering Committee for the Age Friendly Massachusetts Initiative.
- Participated in Coalition to promote Age Friendly throughout the Commonwealth, and secured funding for staffing and infrastructure.
- Maintained relationship with the Mass in Motion Communities to explore future collaboration.

Economic Security

- Sponsored the Benefits Counseling and Application Assistance program that provides comprehensive application assistance for older adults living in Berkshire, Franklin and Hampshire counties.
- Funded 6 regional biweekly job search skills training and networking groups for job seekers 50+.
- Worked with the SNAP Gap coalition to increase the outreach and enrollment efforts for the SNAP program.
- Attended NCOA's Annual Benefits Conference.
- Purchased a state license of NCOA's BenefitsCheckUp eligibility screening software.

Outreach to Underserved Populations

- Hosted cultural competency training as part of the Creating a Welcoming Place initiative for 65 individuals to develop skills and strategies to identify and serve traditionally underserved populations.
- Produced training films focused on the needs of LGBT communities and people living with dementia as part of the Creating a Welcoming Place initiative.
- Funded assistive listening devices for persons with hearing loss at 41 sites.
- Funded 3 new regional assistive technology training centers for individuals with visual impairment and loss. A representative from MCOA attended the American Foundation for the Blind's Annual Conference to share the pilot model with other states.
- Funded 1 regional support group for Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Commission.
- Signed MOU formalizing the relationship between Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Commission and MCOA.

Capacity Building

- Developed 19 trainings for COA staff including the following topics: workplace safety, protective services, government regulation essentials (ethics, open meeting, procurement, political activity, CORI), transportation, social media, marketing, grandparents raising grandchildren, SNAP application assistance techniques, and housing affordability, maintenance and suitability issues and hoarding. More than 300 hours of training were offered in FY17.
- Offered a range of support to directors, staff and board members including: mentoring, organizational problem solving and resource materials (toolkits, manuals, sample forms/policies/job descriptions).
- Welcomed 19 new COA Directors to our network and conducted onsite orientation visits.
- Developed 8 new manuals/toolkits and in the process of updating an additional 10 manuals/toolkits.
- Held workgroup meetings for staff in Supportive Day, Programming/Activities, and Outreach. Focus in FY18 to expand into in the areas of Board/Friends, Wellness and Volunteer Coordinators.
- Activities Work group developed project goals that include convening meetings, sharing providers and resources, and create a contact list of COA activity staff.
- Developed a database in collaboration with UMass-Boston to compile details about the programs and services provided by COAs locally.
- Hosted three-day Annual Conference attended by 386 participants who participated in 81 workshops and 3 plenary sessions.
- Updated online File Cabinet to include additional resources of interest to COA staff.
- Partnered with CADER & MAOA to promote on line and in person Mental Health training opportunities.
- Supported Bridges Together trainings that served 54 communities to initiate intergenerational activities in their communities.
- Established a committee to review MCOA Certification and explore alignment with NISC Accreditation.

Mental Health

- Launched 3 regional elder mental health outreach teams to deliver timely, enhanced access to mental health treatment for individuals from 16 communities.
- Served on the MA Mental Health and Older Adults Coalition.
- Supported legislation to increase funding for community-based geriatric mental health services.
- Funded 8 regional biweekly bereavement support groups.
- Co-sponsored Buried in Treasures facilitator trainings for 40 individuals.
- Co-sponsored the Annual Aging and Dignity Conference on preventing and responding to substance abuse and related problems in older adults.

Nutrition

- Hosted five comprehensive SNAP enrollment trainings for staff of 77 COAs.
- Partnered with DTA to develop SNAP enrollment centers at local COAs in FY18 to facilitate enrollment of older adults.
- Partnered with EOEA on the Annual Nutrition Forum to improve the quality of meals served at our Senior Centers.

Transportation

- Advocated extensively with Mass. Senior Action Council and the Boston Center for Independent Living around the issue of the MBTA's service reduction proposal of "The Ride."
- Facilitated communication between COAs and DMV for the "RMV Near Me" Initiative launched by the Baker-Polito Administration; the new program trains local COA staffs to offer assistance with online transactions.
- Supported the Brookline-Newton COAs TRIPPS Assist Program, an innovative program funded by MassDOT to guide seniors in alternative means of transportation.
- Collaborated with MassMobility on exploring innovative alternative transportation options.

Housing

- Hosted 2 housing forums to review key housing issues.
- Developed Property Tax Relief fact sheets for use in local outreach.

Healthcare

- Advocated for continuation of funding for the SHINE program.
- Monitored the impact the repeal of the Affordable Healthcare Act will have on Massachusetts Seniors.

Corporation Infrastructure

- Collected the highest percentage of membership dues in FY17 (98.3%).
- Completed Annual Audit for FY16 on time without an extension; earliest on record. No major findings.
- Implemented Disability/Life insurance package for employees.
- Began an agency-wide 403-B Retirement Plan. Eligible employees will be able to make contributions starting next fiscal year.
- Strengthened connections with the Regional Representatives and met with 30 COA directors across the Commonwealth to address issues of mentoring, advocacy and coordination of regional meetings in order to boost attendance.
- Convened MCOA marketing committee to update MCOA's mission, positioning, and values statements.
 Retained two consultants to facilitate a refresh of the MCOA website and to guide us on the marketing project. Also, we increased our social media presence on Twitter and Facebook and we developed a new social media policy approved by the MCOA Board.
- With the assistance of another consultant and in cooperation with NISC, we developed a Marketing Manual for local COAs.
- Tabled Charity Campaign: After several years of raising funds for Disaster Relief and the Alzheimer's Association, MCOA has put this effort on hold.


Municipal COAs need to continue to grow to meet the needs of the expanding 60+ population






4 Takeaways from this chart:


- 1. The 60+ population has increased by an estimated 315,000 adults since April 1, 2010, a 24.6% growth.
- 2. On December 31st of 2016, for the first time in Massachusetts history, the number of people in our Commonwealth age 60 and over became greater than the population under 20.
- 3. Over the next 20years
 - overall population growth in Massachusetts will be 11.8%;
 - but the age 60+ population will grow at a phenomenal 64.8%.
 - The 20-59 age cohort will remain steady
 - However under age 20 population is projected to decrease slightly.
- 4. Are we ready? This is a question that should be asked over and over as our Commonwealth ages. By 2035 nearly 29% of our residents will be age 60+. Do we have the infrastructure in place to meet this need? In addition, other projections indicate that the 85+ population will also see a dramatic increase as residents live longer. Most will want to stay in their community; what are the implications for COAs?


















Financial Position at Year End of FY 2016


